## **June Program**

If you have aluminum wire, please bring different gauges if you'd like to practice. The club wire caddy will also be available. Bring a small or medium sized tree you want to wire. Branches and pipe cleaners will be provided as well.

Dr. Harkaway is a member of the Pennsylvania Bonsai Society, has served on the National Bonsai Foundation Board of Directors, and is currently the President of the American Bonsai Society. In April of this year, she displayed a Colorado blue spruce at the MABS Spring Festival, and afterwards, it was donated to the National Bonsai and Penjing Museum in Washington D.C.

#### **Next Year's Programs (Rob King)**

I know it is only June but this is the time to start thinking of programs for next year. We have three venues but they are not available every month. We also have to match programs with the proper seasons. Other things that we look for is to have members of the club to step up and present a program, especially the new members. If you don't think that you have enough for the whole two hours, we can set you up with a shortened time and have somebody else take the other part of the meeting.

I have been approached by several members who requested another bus trip, maybe to the Potomac Bonsai Association Festival. This is a great idea to do especially for those that have not attended MABS, who are not comfortable putting up the MABS' fees. The PBA Festival gives a good taste of what a Festival is like

because it is free - not counting the bring your own tree workshop.

Visiting artists to come to our place present their own set of challenges. We have to find out the artist's schedule to see if it matches both our meeting dates and the venue. If they live more than 2.5 hours away, we offer them a hotel room for Friday night. When coming up with ideas, please remember that we already have January, May, July, August, and November booked.

#### Rob's Bonsai Care Schedule

What do I do: There are three necessary activities that you must take with your trees to keep them healthy. They are bonsai mix, fertilization and treating the trees with pesticides. The problem that comes up time and time again is what do you use so that your tree has maximum health. Ask 12 different bonsai artists about advice in doing these and you get 12 different answers. I've come up with my procedures and I do know that they differ from almost all the bonsai artists with which I interact. Here are my workings.

**Bonsai Mix**: Akadama, Perlite/Pumice, Vermiculite, Stone, Mulch and Charcoal. Once I run out of Akadama and Stone, I will order more with Bonsai Jack (switching from stone to lava). I hand screen all my mix before using it. Just this year, I screened >175 gallons of my four sizes of mix.

**Fertilization:** I fertilize my trees quite heavily. I use organic fertilizer pellets on the surface, which I change once every month. Every week, I fertilize with an inorganic

fertilizer (Any dry fertilizer that is blue in color and which contains micronutrients) to which I add either HB101 or SuperThrive, and a silicon splash.

Pesticide: The main kind of pests I get on my trees are mainly Juniper-Apple Rust (Mainly junipers because I have no apples), Chinese Elm leaf rollers, and scale on my ficus. I have four pesticides that are very different from each other and I apply them in a weekly rotation. For me, I find that when I use these in rotation, my trees stay fungus and insect free. What I am most glad about is that I have removed the ugly, slimy apple-cider rust from forming on my junipers. I had junipers that would be 80% covered in the fungus. Three years ago, I started using a pesticide that was aimed heavily at preventing fungus and it has worked like magic.

My recommendation is that if you are doing something that works for your trees, don't change!!! If you decide to change something, test it on a few "throw away" trees before adding it to your regiment.
